This process was conducted by IND in coordination with Mozambique Armed Defense Forces. Location of destruction sites: Mine clearance activities were conducted in 6 Provinces of Central and South: Maputo, Gaza, Inhambane, Sofala, Manica and Tete.	Details of:
Operations were carried out by three major humanitarian operators and local commercial operators: APOPO, Handicap International, Halo Trust and commercial operators which cleared in total 3.6 Sqm; removed and destroy 575 AP mines, 282 AG mines, 57 AT mine and 1426 UXOs. In total 63 districts were concluded and considered of no known existing mined areas. Out of 3.7 million sqm, 1.3 million sqm were based on the baseline data, additionally 1million sqm were released through non technical methods. Remark: In accordance with Article 5, para.2: "Each State Party shall make every effort to identify all areas under its jurisdiction or control in which anti-personnel mines are known or suspected to be emplaced and shall ensure as soon as possible that all anti-personnel mines in mined areas under its jurisdiction or control are perimeter-marked, monitored and protected by fencing or other means, to ensure the effective exclusion of civilians, until all anti-personnel mines contained therein have been destroyed. The marking shall at least be to the standards set out in the Protocol on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Mines, Booby-Traps and Other Devices, as amended on 3 May 1996, annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects".

[Narrative:] MRE activities are conducted at a national level in a continuous base, with more focus on areas where mine clearance is undertaken and around communities affected by landmines. MRE is implemented by all humanitarian operators during their clearance task and upon completion in coordination by IND staff. The MRE focal points are instructed to communicate information on the risk caused by mines and possible behavior and attitude to prevent such accidents. Additionally, those sessions also serve to collect information on suspected areas or accidents and victims. IND field staff and demining operators conducted 129 MRE sessions in 12 districts of 6 provinces where approximately 35,737 people in affected communities. In 2009 IND registered 9 accidents (mines/UXO), which claimed 19 casualties.
