			Eritrea does not possess any stockpiled mines. All mines that had been possessed by Eritrea were laid in minefields during the latest conflict. Only a small number of APMs are currently held at the Eritrean Demining Authority National Training Center which are used for training.
			Eritrea does not produce mines, nor has it purchased any mines. All the mines Eritrea possesses have been recovered from Ethiopian minefields or storage facilities. In 1991 the Eritrean Peoples Libertion Front (EPLF) Engineers recovered approximately 450,000 mines; however thousands were broken, had missing parts, or were otherwise deteriorated, and were disposed / destroyed since they were of no use to the Army. All the remainder were laid in minefields, and due to shortages often recovered and relaid. None remained in stockpile / storage after the 1998 – 2000 war.
			According to current information, Eritrea can account a total of approximately 150,000 anti personnal in minefields and 3,329 destroyed in recent mine clearance operations.
			An undetermined number of mines were laid (and remain in the ground) in other parts of the country during the period of the struggle 1961 to 1991.

Form I Measures to provide warning to the population

Article 7.1 "Each State Party shall report to the Secretary-General ... on:

i) The measures taken to provide an immediate and effective warning to the population in relation to all areas identified under paragraph 2 of Article 5."

Remark: In accordance with Article 5, para.2: "Each State Party shall make every effort to identify all areas under its jurisdiction or control in which anti-personnel mines are known or suspected to be emplaced and shall ensure as soon as possible that all anti-personnel mines in mined areas under its jurisdiction or control are perimeter-marked, monitored and protected by fencing or other means, to ensure the effective exclusion of civilians, until all anti-personnel mines contained therein have been destroyed. The marking shall at least be to the standards set out in the Protocol on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Mines, Booby-Traps and Other Devices, as amended on 3 May 1996, annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects".

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Preliminary survey has been carried out by International NGOs (HALO Trust and Danish Demining Group), and Eritrean Defence Force and Ethiopian Forces records have been assimilated and reviewed / recorded. This process has resulted in the identification of AP mined areas as described in Form C. In addition, a country wide Landmine Impact Survey (LIS) has been been initiated. This LIS is expected to be completed by early summer 2004.

An extensive Mine Risk Education programme took place during the period from 1 February to 31 July 2002 has conducted the following activities :

<u>Community Based MRE</u> - to affected communities for internally displaced persons and for returning refugees through local and international NGOs reached 70,000 people. <u>Training</u> – an MRE trainer was hired to develop the local training capacity of specialist MRE instructors for the National Training Center (NTC), train teachers, train community facilitators and to develop training manuals. School Based - 268 teachers have been trained by NTC MRE instructors and now carrying out MRE lessons in their schools. <u>Mass Media</u>- Ministry of Information began broadcasting MRE programmes on a weekly basis as of November 2001 in Tigrinia and translated into eight languages. Further MRE- type broadcasting took place on the children's programme every two weeks on a Saturday. Dissemination of landmine posters, handouts, educational children's games and other educational materials and MRE billboards were erected in 12 high-risk areas near the border. With the departure of INGOs during the fall of 2002, the programme was suspended with the exception of two MRE teams working near the border. Six MRE Teams have recently been formed in the Eritrean Demining Operations and are about to commence work.
