The Convention on the prohibition of the use, stockpiling, production and transfer of APMs and on their destruction was ratified by the Estonian parliament on 24 March 2004. The Convention is part of Estonia's national legal system and Estonia is in full compliance with the provisions of the Convention.	
The Strategic Goods Act in force from 1 March 2020 explicitly prohibits the transfer of antipersonnel mines and the related services, except in the case when it is absolutely necessary for the purpose of training or the demolition thereof. For the purposes of this Act the transfer of strategic goods is the import, export, transit and transfer of defence-related products within the European Union.	
Violations of the provisions of the Convention committed by persons will be punished according to Paragraphs 93 and 103 of the Estonian Penal Code.

The marking shall at least be to the standards set out in the Protocol on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Mines, Booby-Traps and Other Devices, as amended on 3 May 1996, annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects".

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[Narrative / reference to other reports:]

During 2020, the Estonian Rescue Board conducted Mine Awareness and Remnants of War familiarization and identification events to approximately 9600 people, more than 7000 of them were children. The Estonian Rescue Board Prevention department and EOD Centre's four regional bomb groups addressed the people via 304 different events (training, prevention, study days, public events).

In 2020, the EOD conducted the destruction of 9041 explosive remnants of war, which amongst other included 5145 shells, 2351 mortar mines, 1310 grenades, 66 airplane bombs and 49 landmines.

Since 1999, Estonia has annually contributed to the United Nations Voluntary Trust Fund for Assistance in Mine Clearance. In recent years, Estonia has prioritized mine action assistance through UNMAS in areas liberated from Daesh in Syria and Iraq. Over the time period of 2016-2019, our contribution amounts to 130 000 USD in total. In 2020, Estonia contributed to UNMAS for mine action activities in Iraq and Syria in the amount of 30 000 USD.

Since early 2000's, personnel from Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) unit of the Estonian Defence Forces has taken part in demining efforts in Afghanistan. In April 2020, four deminers from the Estonian Defense Forces and one engineer commander from the 1st Infantry Brigade were sent to Afghanistan on a new mission. Estonians serve in Afghanistan as part of the German contingent in Mazar-e-Sharif

From 2009-2013, Estonia was among the lead nations for NATO/PfP Trust Fund project on ERW including anti-personnel land mines' clearance and medical rehabilitation support to Georgia (NATO/PfP Georgia III Trust Fund). The objectives of the project were the development and enhancement of Georgia's Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) capacity, through the provision of specialist EOD equipment and training to the Georgian Armed Forces and the provision of the establishment of a physical rehabilitation centre at the Military Hospital in Gori. Estonia's contribution to the Trust Fund was EUR 136,667. In 2013, a continual project was launched to the previous NATO/PfP Trust Funds. The objective of the NATO/PfP Trust Fund project was EOD clearance

at the former SKRA ammunition depot and further development training to the previously trained EOD Company. Estonia's contribution to the Trust Fund was EUR 100,000.

In 2016-2017 Estonia launched a project to support the establishment of humanitarian demining training programme in the Ukrainian Lviv State University of Life Safety. The main goal of the project was to support establishment of the training system in the field of humanitarian demining in Ukraine. The project continued until the end of 2019. Estonia contributed to the project over 152 000 EUR in total. In the framework of the project, methodology of the explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) officers' training in Ukraine and their training curricula was developed. Ukrainian students and instructors have received trainings in Estonia and the whole concept of EOD training in Lviv State University of Life Safety was elaborated. Special attention was turned to use of the International Mine Association Standards (IMAS) in the EOD practice in Ukraine. As an outcome, the EOD training department of the university started functioning in full scale. Estonia has previously supported the Ukrainian Emergency Situations Service in the field of humanitarian demining. The final fund of the last project was 76 600 EUR.
