At the Fifth Review Conference in 2024, all States Parties, in adopting the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan committed to take a number of actions to contribute to the effective implementation of the Convention.

As indicated in the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan, the information submitted by States Parties in their annual Article 7 reports serves as the main data source to assess progress. The President and members of the Coordinating Committee are responsible for measuring progress within their mandate, with support of the Implementation Support Unit. A baseline value for all indicators will be established based on data reported contained in Article 7 reports due by 30 April 2025, progress in subsequent years will be compared to this baseline. States Parties are encouraged to provide detailed information on implementation, allowing for as accurate an assessment as possible of the implementation of the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan 2025-2029.

How to use the checklist

In accordance with your State's outstanding obligations and commitments under the Convention and the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan, your State is encouraged to ensure that information highlighted in the checklist is provided within your Article 7 Report due annually by **30 April**. The checklist
