I. Cooperation and assistance

Since 1999, Estonia has annually contributed to the United Nations Voluntary Trust Fund for Assistance in Mine Clearance. Estonia has increased its contributions to efforts in humanitarian demining over the past years and continues to do so. This includes financial support to the United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS), as well as clean-up of various explosive remnants of war and mine-clearance activities under bilateral and international humanitarian projects.

Estonia has contributed to UNMAS since 2011. Over the time period of 2011-2024, our contribution amounts to 220 000 USD in total. In 2024, Estonia contributed to UNMAS for mine action activities in the amount of 10 000 USD.

Furthermore, in 2024 Estonia joined the de-mining coalition under the Ukraine Defence Contact Group format.

The defence minister of Estonia recommended Estonia's withdrawal from the Ottawa convention in mid-March of 2025, in solidarity with the defence ministers of Latvia, Lithuania, and Poland. This decision was taken as the security environment in the eastern Baltic Sea region has fundamentally changed and continues to deteriorate. The Russian Federation is flagrantly violating its international obligations, waging a war of aggression to achieve its imperialist goals, and has withdrawn from or is blatantly violating international norms and agreements

Our intentions reflect the gravity of the current security situation and show that some urgent conclusions have been drawn. Estonia considers it reasonable that countries bordering Russia and Belarus discuss and take appropriate steps jointly and in a coordinated manner. This would send a clear message: our countries are ready and able to use all necessary measures to protect our territory and freedom.

In Estonia, decisions regarding the actual weapons systems to be adopted are based on the military advice by the Commander of the Defence Forces (CHOD). The current military assessment of the CHOD does not foresee the need for the Defence Forces to acquire and use anti-personnel mines in the near future, however, it cannot be ruled out that respective needs and military assessment may change over time. Estonia deeply respects international law and wishes to prevent a situation where, in case of an acute threat of war, we would no longer be able to legally withdraw from treaty obligations, complying with all terms and conditions set in the Convention.

The Ministry of Defence and of Foreign Affairs of Estonia assure that Estonia remains firmly committed to the protection of civilians in armed conflict and other core principles of international humanitarian law. The eventual change in our relationship with the APMBC would not affect Estonia's overall commitment to respecting and protecting these rules and principles, and we will continue to uphold them while addressing our security needs. We intend to continue funding mine assistance, engage in demining and mitigating mine damage. Let me also note that in addition to the APMBC, the acquistion and use of anti-personnel mines are regulated by other international norms and agreements, to which Estonia remains a party.
