P4B anti-personnel mines (APMs)	5	On 26 November 2023, two P4B APMs were found on private land at Hell's Kitchen on the Murrell Peninsula, Falkland Islands. After initial investigation, a further three APMs were also found.
		This area had been identified for clearance and was completed as part of the Falkland Islands Mine Clearance Project which culminated in 2020, in line with the International Mine Action Standards. Therefore, the area was not considered a 'mined area' at the time of discovery in November 2023.
		An assessment was made that clearly indicated that the find at Hell's Kitchen did not imply the presence of other irregular or unpredictable mining at other locations.
		After the successful planning, logistical processing, assessment, de-mining and recovery of the area, the mines were destroyed by controlled incineration on 3 April 2024. The residue of that disposal was confirmed fully incinerated, contained no energetic materials and no part could be recognised as having been part of a mine by the EOD Adviser and was deposited appropriately.
		The area was confirmed cleared and safe and the APMs destroyed on 11 April 2024.
