¹ Notes on using the cover page:

1. The cover page could be used as a **complement** to submitting detailed forms adopted at the [First and Second] Meetings of the States parties in instances when the information to be provided in some of the forms in an annual report is the same as it would be in past reports. That is, when using the cover page, only forms within which there is new information would need to be submitted.
2. The cover page could be used as a **substitute** for submitting detailed forms adopted at the [First and Second] Meetings of the States parties only if all of the information to be provided in an annual report is the same as in past reports.
3. If an indication is made on the cover sheet that the information to be provided with respect to a particular form would be unchanged in relationship to a previous year's form, the date of submission of the previous form should be clearly indicated.

New Zealand retains operational stocks of Change Directional Fragmentation M18A1 Claymores which are operated in the command-detonated mode only. These devices are not anti-personnel mines, as defined in Article 2 of the 1997 Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention and are therefore not prohibited under the Convention. The New Zealand Defence Force holds a very limited quantity of inert practice mines, used solely in the training of personnel in Mine Clearance Operations.

Mine Action Programmes:

UNMAS: The New Zealand Aid programme provides untagged core funding to the UN Mine Action Service of NZ\$1 million to support the organisation's work in removing and destroying mines, explosive remnants of war and stockpiles, risk education and advocacy. The New Zealand funding also supports the work that UNMAS does around medical assistance and rehabilitation of those affected by mines.

Cambodia: Clearance of Landmine-affected areas (2012-2014): New Zealand is provided NZ\$1.3 million for mine clearance in north-west Cambodia. New Zealand's contribution is part of a larger contribution of US\$2.5 million (NZ\$3.27 million) for a three-year agricultural development project in heavily affected Otdar Meanchey province. The mine clearance funding by New Zealand will be conducted by the Halo Trust. The agricultural programme aims to reduce vulnerability and improve income and livelihood opportunities for the rural poor through integrated demining and agricultural value chain strengthening.

West Bank: UNMAS De-mining Programme in the West Bank (2011-2013): New Zealand has provided NZ\$2.8 million to UNMAS for a de-mining programme in the West Bank. New Zealand's contribution will assist with the clearance of mined locations to enable development and socio-economic activities by Palestinian communities. The programme will also assist with the development of a Palestinian Mine Action Centre (PMAC) capable of managing all aspects of mine action within the West Bank.

New Zealand has also provided NZ\$160,000 to the Office of the Quartet (UNDP) for the employment of a facilitation and logistical advisor for humanitarian access into the oPt, including access for clearance agencies and supplies.

Egypt: Agricultural Development (2011): New Zealand provided NZ\$600,000 to the UNDP for agricultural development in Egypt's Western Desert region as part of the Egyptian Government's mine clearing and land development strategy.

Libya: New Zealand provided NZ\$1 million through the ICRC to support the medical assistance and rehabilitation of weapon-wounded resulting from the Libya conflict.

The New Zealand Aid programme also priorities core funding to other UN agencies such as UNICEF, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), the Office for the Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), the Office for the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OCHCR) and World Food Programme (WFP), all of which undertake mine action activities as part of their work.

ICRC: The New Zealand Aid programme provides NZ\$2.5 million each year in untagged core funding to support ICRC's work including physical rehabilitation, preventative mine action programmes which focus on risk reduction, education and advocacy work. The advocacy work aims to reduce the human cost of mines and explosive remnants of war.

The New Zealand Aid programme also gives priorities funding to the World Bank which helps address the long term consequences of mines and unexploded ordnance of war on economic and social development.
