In 2011, as in the previous years, Poland contributed to the alleviation of the humanitarian problem caused by unexploded ordnance and landmines, specifically within the NATO - ISAF mission in Afghanistan. Personnel of the Polish Armed Forces executed tasks for the benefit of local populations additionally to their mandatory tasks in the above mentioned period. The activities included among others removal and destruction of the explosive remnants of war (in cases of emergency), as well as providing warning and risk education to the affected communities.

In the reporting period 108 Polish de-miners were directly involved in demining and clearing activities in Afghanistan. They identified and destroyed the following amounts of dangerous items:

- 72 pcs of anti-personnel and anti-tank mines;
- 5 pcs of air bombs;
- 812 pcs of artillery munitions and mortar grenades;
- 4366 pcs of hand and anti-tank grenades;
- 6600 pcs of unexploded ordnance various types of munitions;
- 1230 kg of explosives.
