Leading civil society experts will share the major findings of *Landmine Monitor 2013*, a report detailing global and national developments in landmine use and ban policy, survey and clearance of landmines and other explosive remnants of war, casualties and victim assistance, and funding support in 2012 and the first part of 2013.

In many mine affected countries, landmines and UXO have evolved from being considered as one of the primary causes of disability to one of many causes, requiring shifts in programmatic and policy focus. At the same time the proportion of child mine victims has increased to its current rate where approximately half of all civilian victims are children. This session will provide an update on recent and on-going work both in international level advocacy and in addressing policies and programmes on the ground, with select case studies, and to discuss sustainable capacity for surveillance or monitoring of mine, UXO, IED and other injuries in future.

- 09:00 **TIRAMISU (Toolbox Implementation for Removal of Anti-personnel mines, Submunitions and UXO): a global and comprehensive toolbox for mine action activities.** Hosted by the Royal Military Academy of Belgium. The European Commission always supports efforts towards a mine-free world within a broader context of humanitarian assistance as well as long-term and sustainable socio-economic development programs. The EC recently decided to fund two large projects including about 50 European organizations, NGOs, universities, small and medium sized enterprises and industrial partners. The Royal Military Academy of Belgium coordinates one these projects, TIRAMISU, which aims at providing the foundation for a global and comprehensive toolbox that will cover the main mine action activities, from the survey of large areas to the actual disposal of explosive hazards, including mine risk education, training and management tools.
- 13:00 **Progress and Challenges of Sudan's Mine Action Programme.** Hosted by Sudan. Room XXIV. Contact: mortadas@su-mac.org. While progress towards meeting Sudan's mine clearance obligations has been significant, a number of obstacles have prevented Sudan from meeting

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its deadline within ten years after entry into force. Given these obstacles, Sudan has requested an extension of its deadline to be considered at the 13MSP. This event will provide an opportunity for delegations to learn about the plan contained in the request and Sudan's vision of continued implementation of its Article 5.

Through a EU Council Decision adopted in December 2012 in support of the implementation of the Cartagena Action Plan 2010-2014, the EU seeks to promote the universalisation of the Convention and its norms, support efforts to implement the victim assistance and mine clearance aspects of the Cartagena Action Plan, and demonstrate the on-going commitment of the EU to the Convention. This event will update delegations on the implementation of the Council Decision.

The GICHD will introduce and launch the new ASM Tool, which is designed to enable safer management of ammunition, whether stockpiles or left over after conflict or military activities, in a cheaper, more cost effective way. It is a risk based tool and therefore designed to concentrate efforts where the hazard is at its worst and the actions carried out can be most effective.

Donors, national authorities and operators are focused on survey and clearance of known and suspected areas of contamination but the complexity of conflict and the nature of contamination in many countries requires appropriate capacity and response mechanisms to address new discoveries of mines/ERW over the longer term. There is a requirement to establish appropriate national capacities to manage residual contamination with realistic approaches that are sustainable. This event aims to provide insights into potential solutions to deal with residual contamination.

What are the various frameworks used for providing assistance to victims? How have these frameworks succeeded so far in meeting the obligations and commitments undertaken by States Parties? Victim assistance is more than the sum of its parts, but although these activities are often synergistic they may also vary significantly in approaches and outcomes. A new research publication by the Landmine and Cluster Munition Monitor sheds light on these questions.

The panel discussion will focus on ways to overcome the particular challenge of restriction of access and how to bring impartial humanitarian relief to populations in need.
