

HAMAP-Humanitaire intervention in Senegal

HAMAP-Humanitaire wishes to support and participate to the mine action dynamic in Senegal, with the aim of providing security for vulnerable populations in the Bignona department, by supporting CNAMS mandate in line with its international commitments.





The current situation

Today in Senegal, all demining operators are stressing the same needs: the completion of the non-technical surveys as soon as possible in order to establish a complete baseline estimate of the remaining contamination

1,593,487 m² estimated nationwide and 1,100,000 m² in the Ziguinchor region alone

118 localities not visited, including 101 in the Bignona department alone

9 Suspected hazardous areas in the Ziguinchor region, hypothetically covering 1.1 km².

37 Confirmed hazardous areas in the Ziguinchor region, covering 0.49 km².

A mine-free Senegal can only be credible if its contamination is recognized and quantified



Our approach

HAMAP-Humanitaire's approach to this project is based on the fundamental pillar of local capacity building.

Support mine clearance in Senegal by strengthening the organizational and technical capacity of local civil society

- Development of local skills that can be deployed on a national or subregional scale;
- Implementation of the project's operational activities by APIT-Humanitaire, with the support of HAMAP-Humanitaire regional experts;
- + HAMAP-Humanitaire will be responsible for project monitoring, capacity building, quality assurance, supervision and ongoing mentoring.

Phase I - Supporting the mandate of the Centre National Action Antimines in Senegal, by identifying contaminated areas in the Ziguinchor region

- Raise awareness among vulnerable populations in the Bignona department by promoting safe behaviour in the face of explosive risk
- Maintain and strengthen community links in order to perpetuate safe behavior and identify contaminated areas in the Bignona department.
- Strengthening local mine action capacities within the Senegalese NGO APIT-Humanitaire
