
Why report?

- Obligation under Article 7 / Commitments under the Oslo Action Plan
- Key to understanding the remaining global challenge
- Reporting is an opportunity
- Key to the work of the Convention's Committees

Transparency Reporting - Article 7

Initial report 180 days after entry into force/ annual updates by 30 April

- national implementation measures;
- stockpiled anti-personnel mines;
- Location of mined areas;
- Mines retained or transferred for permitted reasons;
- Programmes for the conversion or de-commissioning of anti-personnel mine production facilities;
- Mine clearance and stockpile destruction programmes;
- Technical characteristics of mines produced, owned or possessed;
- Measures taken to provide warnings to populations of mined areas.





Transparency Reporting - Article 7

Information that needs to be provided on mined areas

- Article 7.1.c): To the extent possible, the location of all mined areas that contain, or are suspected to contain, antipersonnel mines under its jurisdiction or control, to include as much detail as possible regarding the type and quantity of each type of anti-personnel mine in each mined area and when they were emplaced;
- Article 7.1.i): The measures taken to provide an immediate and effective warning to the population in relation to all areas identified under paragraph 2 of Article 5;
- Article 7.1.f): The status of programs for the destruction of anti-personnel mines in accordance with Article 5, including details of the methods which will be used in destruction, the location of all destruction sites and the applicable safety and environmental standards to be observed.





Oslo Action Plan-Survey and Clearance



Actions #18 – #27

- identify the precise perimeter of mined areas/evidence-based baselines (Action #18)
- develop evidence-based and costed national work plans
- adjusted milestones in Article 7 reports by 30 April each year
- States Parties affected by anti-personnel mines of an improvised nature will apply all provisions of Convention (Action#21)
- report in a manner consistent with IMAS (Action#22)
- States requesting extension will include: costed and multi-year work plans for the extension period and are developed through an inclusive process/ detailed, costed and multi-year plans for context-specific mine risk education and reduction
- make provisions for a <u>sustainable national capacity</u>
- improve the effectiveness and efficiency of survey and clearance

Oslo Action Plan - Mine Risk Education and Reduction



Actions #28 - #32

- #28: Integration into wider efforts, as well as with ongoing survey, clearance and victim assistance activities
- #29: Context-specific mine risk education and reduction programmes developed on the basis of a needs assessment; tailored to the threat encountered; sensitive to gender, age, disability and take the diverse needs and experiences of people in affected communities into account
- #30: Prioritize people most at risk casualty and contamination data, an understanding of the affected population's behaviour, risk pattern and coping mechanisms, and, wherever possible, anticipated population movements
- #31: Build national capacity
- #32: Report in Article 7 reports including the methodologies used, the challenges faced and the results achieved, with information disaggregated by gender and age




