STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION – VICTIM ASSISTANCE

COMMITTEE ON VICTIM ASSISTANCE

(Burkina Faso, the Netherlands, Slovenia (Chair) and Zambia)

Intersessional Meetings

18-20 June 2024

1. The Committee welcomes the submission by Jordan of updated information on its victim assistance activities.
2. Based on the information provided, the Committee presents the following preliminary observations.

Mine casualties

1. Jordan reported 1,018 mine survivors including 91 women and girls and 927 boys and men, with no new casualty reported in 2023.
2. The Committee would welcome further information disaggregated by age and disability on mine victims including the survivors and those who have been killed and indirect victims, such as affected families.

VICTIM ASSISTANCE ACTIONS:

Strengthen partnerships and integrate victim assistance into broader national policies, plans and legal frameworks and designation of a government entity to oversee the integration (Action #33 and Actions #1 and #6)

3. Jordan reported that the National Authority for Demining and Rehabilitation (NCDR), under the guidance of the Higher Council for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, continued to follow up assistance provided to mine victims.

Develop and implement measurable, realistic, and time-bound national action plan (Action #33 and Action #2)

4. Jordan reported having holistic policies including a national strategy for the rights of persons with disabilities in place which also guides assistance to mine victims.
5. The Committee would welcome information on plans in place to oversee and measure progress and achievements of integrated plans, in relation to fulfilling Jordan's commitments under the Convention and the OAP.

Removing barriers including physical, social, cultural, political, attitudinal and communication barriers to access such services (Action #33)

6. Jordan reported that efforts have been made to meet the needs of mine survivors, to reduce the negative social, economic, and environmental effects on their lives, by ensuring their full participation based on respect for human rights, gender and non-discrimination.

7. The Committee recalls that Jordan previously reported undertaking significant policy work to improve accessibility to public services, would welcome an update on progress made in this regard.

Applying multi-sectoral efforts to ensure that the needs and rights of mine victims are effectively addressed in line with the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (Action #34)

8. Jordan reported adopting an integrated approach by applying inclusive and comprehensive public policies for the rights of persons with disabilities and by implementing specific programmes to ensure the needs of mine survivors are met, in accordance with provisions of the Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention.
9. The Committee recalls that Jordan reported that the needs and rights of mine survivors have been integrated into broader policies, especially those related to disabilities, including plans and policies developed for the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD).

Establish or strengthen of a centralised database / national information management system (Action #35 and Action #9)

10. The Committee recalls in previous year, Jordan reported that a working group was created to follow up and update the national database of mine casualties.
11. The Committee would welcome information on progress made in updating the national database of mine casualties and on the integration of mine casualty data into relevant national databases, such as national disability database or injury surveillance registry.

Access to first aid and ongoing emergency medical care (Action #36)

12. Jordan reported that health care is provided to mine survivors by the Royal Medical Services and the Ministry of Health (MOH) through Al-Bashir Hospital in the capital, Amman and through Royal Medical Services across the country.

Developing national referral mechanism (Action #37)

13. The Committee would welcome information on the status of a national referral mechanism and directory of services or plan to develop them to further facilitate mine victims' access to services.

Access to rehabilitation services including physiotherapy, assistive devices, and occupational therapy (Action #38)

14. Jordan reported the availability of physical rehabilitation services by the Royal Medical Services and the MOH as well as by some private healthcare and rehabilitation centres.
15. The Committee would welcome further information on availability of occupational therapy for mine survivors and other persons with disabilities in Jordan.

Access to psychological and psychosocial services including peer-to-peer support (Action #38)

16. Jordan reported on continuation of provision of psychological support including through home visits as well as survey of survivors to identify those in need of psychological support.

17. The Committee would welcome further information on the findings of the survey and the number of mine victims benefited from psychological support.

18. The Committee would also welcome information on provision of peer-to-peer support and its integration into national healthcare system.

Access to social and economic inclusion services, including in rural and remote areas (Action #39)

19. Jordan reported that the NCDR continued paying “special attention” to economic integration programs to raise the standard of living of survivors and their families.

20. The Committee would welcome further information on progress made with regards to social and economic inclusion of mine survivors and their families including in rural and remote areas, and the number of mine victims received such supports.

Taking measure for safety and protection of mine survivors in situations of risks and emergencies (Action #40)

21. The Committee would welcome information on measures that are in place or are planned to ensure the safety and protection of mine survivors in situations of risks and emergencies including humanitarian emergencies, natural disasters.

Strengthening inclusion and participation of mine victims and their representative organisations in all matters that affect them (Action #41 and Action #4)

22. Jordan reported ensuring the participation of mine survivors and persons with disabilities in relevant programmes, including decision-making, public policies, and relevant conferences, based on respect for human rights, gender equality and non-discrimination.

CROSS - CUTTING ACTIONS:

Demonstrate high levels of national ownership, including [...] by making financial and other commitments to implementation (Action #1)

23. Jordan reported national budgetary allocation of 230,000 dinars to the NCDR.

24. The Committee would welcome further information on allocation of financial and other commitments, by the Government of Jordan, to victim assistance activities.

Ensure that the different needs and perspectives of women, girls, boys and men are considered (Action #3)

25. Jordan reported that gender equality and non-discrimination are considered in Jordan’s victim assistance efforts.

Challenges in implementation of Victim Assistance Commitments (Action #8)

26. Jordan reported that resources are limited for victim assistance. The Committee would welcome further information on challenges faced by Jordan in the provision of Victim Assistance and information on how the international community can assist Jordan in fulfilling its Victim Assistance commitments under the Convention and the OAP.
