

## Right of Reply 1

Madam President,

Since Cambodia continues to deny its violations of the obligations under the Convention and **accuses Thailand of politicizing the case of seven soldiers** who have lost their legs from stepping on newly emplaced landmines, I have no choice but to show parts of the evidence to this Meeting.

### **Slide 1 – showing Thai soldier retrieving a mobile phone from the site**

This piece of evidence is derived from a mobile phone found by Thai military officers on **19 August 2025**, at coordinates VA61437 96560 in Phlan Yao base area, Si Sa Ket Province – the location previously occupied by **the Cambodian Army** during the conflict but had vacated the area.

### **Slide 2 – showing a video clip of Cambodian soldiers being trained to plant PMN-2 mines**

On the mobile phone, we found a **video clip, recorded on 8 June 2025**, showing **Cambodian personnel being trained in the laying of PMN-2 mines – not to remove them.**

### **Slide 3 – showing images of Cambodian soldiers emplacing a PMN-2 mine**

We also obtained **images, recorded on 19 August 2025, at 14.32 hrs**, showing Cambodian soldiers emplacing a PMN-2 mine. These were obtained via the Telegram application under the phone owner's account. Forensic analysis later identified one individual in the images as a Cambodian officer who had previously met with Thai officers at the Phlan Yao meeting point.

We are keeping all identities of these Cambodian soldiers confidential in this Meeting for data privacy reason. But we have submitted all information and evidence – **108 pages long in total – to the UN Secretary-General.**

We would also like to add that, it was Cambodia who first launched an armed attack against the Thai territory, including the use of heavy artillery such as

BM-21 rockets, in the morning of 24 July 2025, and continued to violate ceasefire agreements between both parties.
