

# IMPLEMENTATION SUPPORT UNIT 2026 BUDGET AND WORK PLAN

22 September 2025

Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention

## Introduction

The following budget and activities should be read in conjunction with the Implementation Support Unit's five-year work plan covering the period 2025-2029, which was adopted by the States Parties at the [Fifth Review Conference](#).

## 2026 Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention ISU Budget

### Staff costs

The 2026 budget is intended to cover the salaries and related social costs of 3.6 full-time-equivalent staff positions. These positions include one full-time director, two full-time professional officers, and one professional officer at 60%.

### Travel costs

The 2026 budget is intended to cover the costs of an estimate of up to twenty-six (26) missions by ISU staff, including:

- Ten (10) missions for Article 5 implementation support;
- Five (5) missions to support States Parties in the implementation of their victim assistance commitments;
- Five (5) missions for liaison and/or participation in conferences, UN meetings, or similar events that relate to matters concerning the implementation of the Convention;

As a rule, the cost of staff travel is in economy class in line with the GICHD Internal Rules and Regulations.

### Communication, public relations, and other implementation support costs

Other implementation support costs include room rentals for committee meetings, catering for lunch-time meetings, online meeting platforms, working translations of requests for extended mine clearance deadlines and Article 7 reports, amongst other documents, interpretation, publications, communications, website, online reporting tool maintenance, short-term consultancies/support, and staff training.

### Financial Security Buffer

At the time of drafting this work plan and budget, the financial security buffer contained a total of CHF 758'655, in line with the decision of the Fourteenth Meeting of the States Parties (14MSP) to ensure that the buffer contains an amount equivalent to one year of ISU expenditures in order to guarantee the basic operation of the ISU for any foreseeable year.

## Other activities

On 16 June 2025, the ISU concluded an agreement on a Project with the European Union (EU) Council Decision 2025/781 *in support of the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan for the implementation of the 1997 Convention on the Prohibition of the Use, Stockpiling, Production and Transfer of Anti-Personnel Mines and on their Destruction*. Staff costs for implementation of the project are covered by the EU Council Decision. The technical implementation of this Decision, like for the previous EU Council Decision **2021/257**), is entrusted to the ISU. The project totals EUR 2 700 000 for activities to be carried out over a period of four years from 2025–2029. These activities will enhance the ISU’s engagement with States Parties concerning their implementation of the Convention and commitments under the Siem Reap-Angkor Action Plan 2025-2029 (SRAAP).

## Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining (GICHD) support to the ISU

Costs for infrastructure, logistics, and administrative services in support of the ISU (i.e., office rent and supplies, information technology and telecommunications, travel services, human resources, insurance, financial management, day to day website costs and contract and document management) are not included in this budget. The GICHD general budget will cover these costs with funds provided by Switzerland. The estimated value of these activities is a result of monitoring by the GICHD of actual levels of support provided in the past.

The GICHD will also provide general administrative support to the ISU in relation to the implementation of the European Union Council decision. The support of the GICHD in this regard is compensated by the Council Decision.

Costs related to the administration of the Sponsorship Programme, including travel and accommodation services as well as reporting and auditing, will be covered by the GICHD, again on the basis of funds provided by Switzerland. Costs associated with the strategic direction provided to the Sponsorship Programme Director will be borne by the ISU (i.e. staff costs).
