



## Victim Assistance National Stakeholders Dialogue Promoting a Strategic Approach to Victim Assistance

25-27 September 2018

The Prime Minister's Guest House, Green Zone, Baghdad

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### Background

Iraq is one of 29 States Parties to the Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention reporting responsibility for significant numbers of landmine survivors. In its 2016 Article 7 report, Iraq reported that its Victim Assistance (VA) efforts sought to “increase availability of and accessibility to appropriate comprehensive rehabilitation services, economic inclusion opportunities and social protection measures for all mine victims”, in line with *Maputo Action Plan* commitments. In the past couple of years, Iraq has focused its efforts on data collection and surveying, yet efforts have been hampered by the security situation.

### National Stakeholder Dialogue objectives

In 2017, the Council of the European Union approved Decision 2017/1428, in support of the implementation of the Convention among States Parties currently implementing victim assistance efforts to integrate the rights of landmine survivors and other persons with disabilities into wider national frameworks. EU support includes hosting national stakeholder dialogues where affected States, partners and donors can meet to advance these efforts.

The mid-September National Stakeholder Dialogue and enhanced follow-up technical support co-sponsored by the European Union's Decision could result in Iraq obtaining greater clarity as to its implementation of victim assistance aspects called for in the *Maputo Action Plan*, and integration into broader frameworks. This would also be an opportunity for Iraq to address some of the questions asked and recommendations made by the Convention's Committee on Victim Assistance.

The Dialogue in Iraq, which is also Party to the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) and the Convention on Cluster Munitions (CCM), would also seek to support the victim assistance and disability rights aspects covered by all three Conventions. The Stakeholder Dialogue could also support Iraq in kick-starting the process to develop a national victim assistance action plan by identifying challenges, priorities, and mapping of resources required for victim assistance implementation. Such a plan could provide a roadmap for all relevant actors, and assist in identifying mechanisms for CRPD implementation.
